## A Message From Our Governor

Dear Ohio Mayflower Family,

As many of you know, I love to read. Borders is closing and I loved going in to touch and purchase books. I also have a yearning to stop at nearly every Goodwill or Salvation Army store to look at cast away books. I've found treasures on occasion. If you are a reader you just might find a book related to your Mayflower family!

In one of my outings to Borders, I found a "heavy" book with the title: *The Great Migrations: From the Earliest Humans to the Age of Globalization*. This volume has wonderful maps showing the migration patterns as far back as the migration of the human family out of Africa and it has a map showing the migration of the "First Americans c. 15,000 years ago."

The place I'd begin in this issue of the "Ohio Buckeye" is with the Celtic migrations of the years c. 500-272 BC. They came out of central Europe and crossed the Alps "into Italy and, following the River Danube, east to the Carpathian Mountains and beyond onto the Ukrainian steppes; they also went southeast into the Balkans and Greece and across the Bosphorus into Anatolia. Small groups even finished up in Syria and Egypt."

Another of the migrating groups was Indo-Europeans, from which the Germans were an offshoot, who were moving about in a time line of about c. 3500-1500 BC. These folk had spread across the area which we know as Iran all the way to present day England and north into Norway and Sweden. *Continued on p. 2*

They went also as far south in Europe as Crete and west into Spain and Portugal. About 113 BC, the Cimbri and the Teutones came to the attention of those who lived in the Mediterranean world. Their original homeland was in Jutland where was found an ancient large silver caldron in 1891 by a farmer digging in a peat bog. The thirteen panels on the caldron “recount a Celtic foundation myth, in which numerous deities and rituals are featured.”

The reason I share this information with you is that it only highlights the story of our Mayflower family in a small way. With all the movements of people, surely some of the DNA of those early folks found its way into our own. I find it makes me rather humble to know “my line” goes back further than I could have imagined. At least it’s an interesting thought. More next time I write.

Mayflower descendant Margery Wing Sisson Runyan (October 20, 1919-April 2, 2011) died peacefully at the Hospice of Dayton, Ohio at the age of 91. A graduate of Hillsdale Academy in Cincinnati (1937), Smith College in Massachusetts (1941, BA in Government), and Glassboro State College in New Jersey (MA in Library Studies), she worked as a librarian for many years, retiring at age 71 from her position as an audio-visual specialist at the Dayton and Montgomery County Public Library in downtown Dayton, Ohio.

A descendant of two Mayflower wayfarers, Richard Warren and Francis Cook, she was a leader and member of many genealogical societies, including the Mayflower Society, the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Colonial Dames of the 17<sup>th</sup> Century, Dames and Barons of the Magna Charta, the Knights of the Garter, and the Wing Family of America. She held offices in state and local chapters of several of these organizations and took great pride in her heritage, a pride she has passed on to her family.

## Surgeon's Corner

*Adapted from the surgeon's report for the 2011 state meeting.*

A normal sleep cycle begins with stage one and gradually cycles down to stage 4 deep sleep with the first of several periods of REM sleep about 70-90 min after falling asleep and normally continues to cycle from deep to light sleep with REM periods every 90-120 min throughout the night with more REM sleep later in the night.

As we age, we begin to lose stage 4, the deep restorative sleep and may benefit from more naps during the day.

Insomnia is often associated with other medical concerns. Half of all cases of insomnia are due to psychiatric disorders, anxiety, depression, and those with insomnia are also at increased risk for cardiovascular disorders, so evaluation is important.

Intervention begins with adequate evaluation, detailed history and in many circumstances a sleep study, or polysomnography. You really need to interview your sleep partner and keep a sleep diary. This can lead to identification of a number of difficulties.

Avoid stimulants: caffeine (coffee, tea, cola, OTC pain relievers); nicotine; alcohol at night tends to prevent deep sleep stages, and people tend to awaken in the middle of the night.

In summary:

1. Stick to a sleep schedule.
2. Exercise but not too late in the day.
3. Avoid large meals and beverages late at night.
4. If possible avoid medicines that delay or disrupt your sleep.
5. Don't take naps after 3pm.
6. Relax before bed.
7. Take a hot bath before bed.
8. Have a good sleep environment.
9. Have the right sunlight exposure.
10. Don't lie in bed awake.
11. See a doctor if sleep difficulties continue. 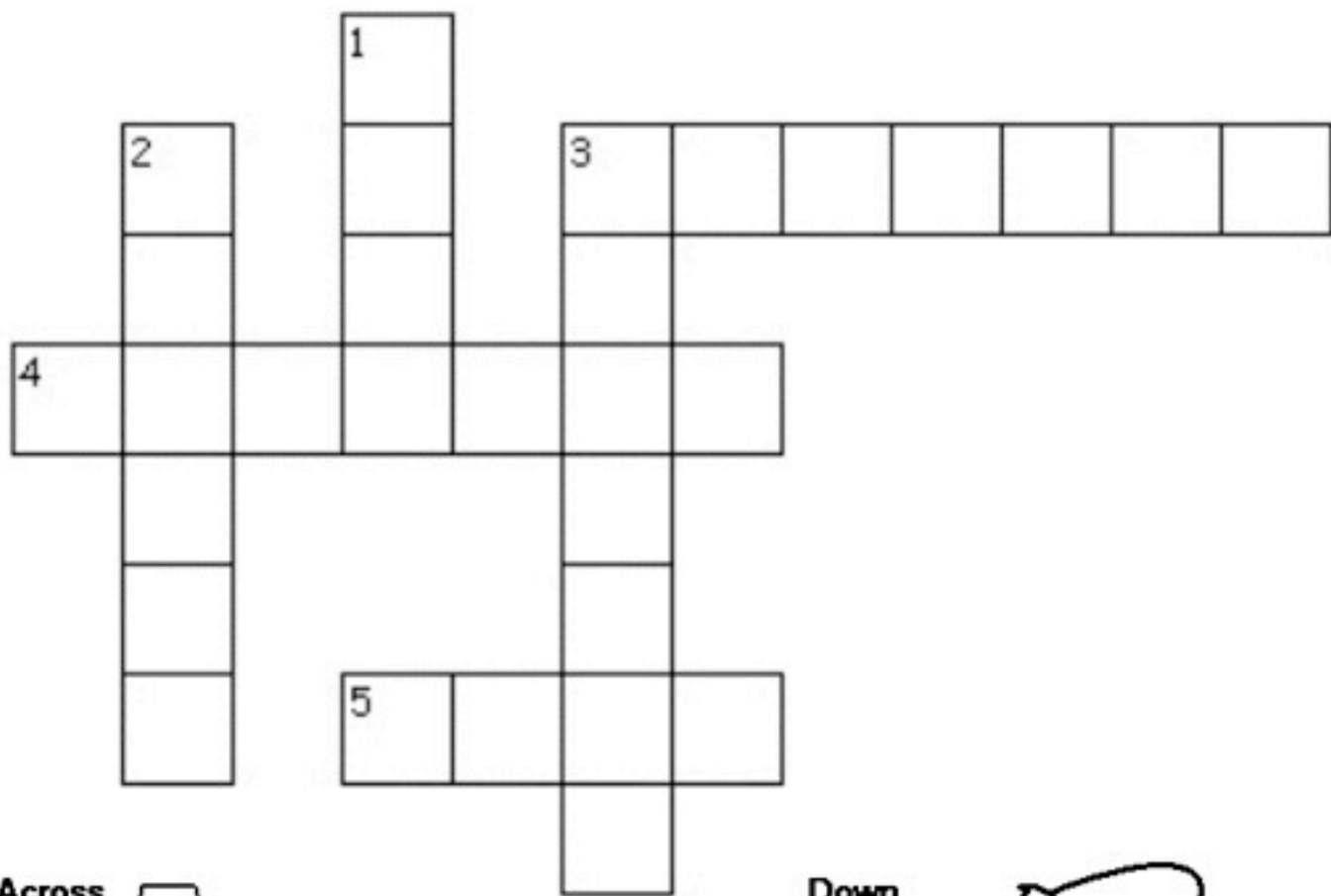

# 2012-2013 Scholarship Information

**DEADLINE: 18 FEBRUARY 2012**

1. A minimum of one \$1,000 scholarship is available.
2. The applicant must be a member or junior member of the Ohio Society. There is no restriction on the residence of the applicant.
3. For the 2012-2013 school year, the applicant must be in the second year or later of a college/university program leading to a bachelor's or advanced degree.
4. The original essay of 750 words or less must be written and signed by the applicant. The topic is "The Effect of Plimoth Colony's Relations with England, 1620-1627." Bibliography required. No Wikipedia citations.
5. The committee will judge the essay on content, accuracy of facts, grammar, and neatness. Bibliography Web sites must still be available at the time of judging.
6. Please use a size 12 or larger font.
7. Send only the originals of documents. Electronically transmitted documents will not be accepted.
8. A person may be awarded a scholarship a maximum of two times.
9. The scholarship need not be given if the committee decides there are no qualified applicants.
10. The winner will be notified by late March 2012 and invited to present the winning essay at the Annual Assembly held in April or May. Expanded information about the winner may be printed in the next issue of the *Buckeye Mayflower*.
11. The award will be paid directly to the student by the Society treasurer upon receiving proof that the student is enrolled for the next school year.
12. An application for the scholarship is on the next page. The blank application may be copied.
13. Mail the application by the postmark deadline of **18 February 2012**.
